



**STATEMENT BY INDONESIA**  
**AT THE JOINT PLENARY OF THE SBI-50 AND SBSTA-50**  
**Bonn, 17 June 2019**

Chairs of SBI-50 and SBSTA-50,  
Distinguished Delegates,

Indonesia associates itself with the statement made by Palestine on behalf of G77 and China.

Katowice Rule Book has provided direction to parties to move forward for the implementation of Convention, Kyoto Protocol and the Paris Agreement. With reference to the IPCC Special Report on Global Warming of 1.5 °C and the increased occurrence of climate related disasters, it is urgent for Parties to focus on actions in reducing GHG emissions substantially and in enhancing resilience from the impact of climate change. Indonesia is fully confident that Parties are working together here in Bonn in a constructive manner to make further progress on the outstanding issues as well as to encourage more concrete outcomes to be adopted in Santiago

Indonesia emphasizes the importance of pre-2020 actions and reiterates concerns over the slow process of Doha Amendment ratification as it inevitably shifts additional burden of post-2020 actions to the developing countries.

On the transparency framework, Indonesia is of the view that a common tabular format should reflect both transparency and NDC progress while also apply the principle of flexibility. On loss and damage, we look forward to the finalization of the Terms of Reference Review 2019 of Warsaw International Mechanism and its further operationalization. On agriculture, we would like to convey our great appreciation and support for the process of Koronivia joint work on agriculture.

Indonesia would also like to highlight the significance of the empowerment of local and relevant ethnic communities' roles in climate actions and policies, through its strong support for the Facilitative Working Group Local Communities and Indigenous Peoples Platform and its work plan for 2020-2022. Indonesia put great importance on the increased availability and accessibility of finance, technology development and transfer and capacity building to developing countries for the effective and full implementation of the Paris Agreement and the Convention.

As the world's largest archipelagic country, Indonesia believes that ocean-climate action plays strategic role in regulating the climate, as the oceans are a hugely important 'carbon sink'. In this regard, Indonesia would like to express its support for the Chile Presidency's "Blue COP" that will be held on December 2019.
