



**STATEMENT OF REPUBLIC OF INDONESIA
IN Joint Closing Plenary SBs 2021
17 June 2021**

Mr. and Madam Chairs,

Indonesia associates itself with the statement made by the Republic of Guinea on behalf of G77 and China.

Indonesia would like to appreciate the Chairs for the leadership, to Co-Facilitators for providing informal notes and the Secretariat for their dedication in facilitating our discussion. Despite the informal nature of this meeting, parties could benefit from sharing views on all important issues with the expectation of having further process in order to conclude our work in Glasgow.

Chairs,

Please allow me to put some brief points of our views on our three-week session.

1. Indonesia appreciates the progress on Art.6 of the PA. Despite some differences, Parties have moved closer towards convergence in the process of the completion of Paris Rules Book. Indonesia welcomes the initiatives to discuss some political aspects of this issues.
2. On the agenda item of common time frames of the NDCs, learning from previous regime of pre-2020 that there should not be any gap in implementation of the Convention, Indonesia views that the communication for the next and/or sub-subsequent NDC should be made as soon as possible, taking into consideration the Dec.1/CP.21 paragraph 23 and 24. Some options on timelines which already put by Parties on the table, that will be enriched in the next session, will be useful to reach an outcome to make our pledges more uniform and allowing a more aligned set of goals that can be assessed and ramped up together.
3. On Enhanced Transparency Framework, Indonesia welcomes the informal notes by Co-Facilitators and foresee that these documents could be a starting point for further discussion. Indonesia would highlight that the content in Informal Notes should be in line with MPGs and ensure the clarity of the operationalization of flexibility and the provision of support for the implementation of ETF for developing country Parties, and CRT as well as CRF should be user friendly and manageable.
4. With regards to Global Stocktake, Indonesia would like to put a strong emphasis on the reflection of equity in whole aspects of GST, including determination of sources of inputs, and it should be

determined in a Party-driven and cross-cutting manner. Paragraph 36 and 37 of Decision 19/CMA.1 could be a good basis to start the phases of the first global stocktake, with more highlight on paragraph 37 (i) that should be in manageable and transparent manner, also taking into account the views from parties equally on the next process

5. With regards to agriculture, Indonesia would like to reemphasize its vulnerability to climate change, while at the same time we are challenged to increase crop and livestock productivity and production to meet increasing demands. Hence, our strategy focuses on adaptation and optimizing the co-benefits.
6. On Climate Finance, Indonesia underlines that it is important the Adaptation Fund has a certainty of the source of income at this transition period. There should be new funding options for the Adaptation Fund including the increase of contribution from the developed countries. The previous two workshops on the Long-Term Finance have provided the Parties an opportunity to exchange views regarding the LTF and *Biennial Submissions*. On the LTF, Indonesia views that the LTF work program must be continued beyond 2020 for the Parties to discuss climate finance-related issues including its challenges.

Indonesia emphasizes the importance of progress for the discussion of the 4th review of the Adaptation Fund. We could continue to discuss the element of the scope for the ToR, the timeline for the ToR and the resulting outcomes.

7. On the National Adaptation Plan, we would like to thank to the LEG who has provided the guiding table to identifying gaps and needs for the formulation and implementation of NAPs. We are highlighting the needs for the resources supporting and capacity building, particularly for the developing country in the NAP formulation and implementation. We also emphasize the need to develop incentives tools and mechanisms that can encourage countries to prepare and submit NAPs reports, and also the simplify of the procedures to access the funding resources, as well as establishing more transparent criteria for the approval process on the proposal for funding support. We also support the proposal on the linkage and harmonization of NAPs with other instruments such as adaptive communication, SDGs, and the Sendai framework for disaster risk reduction.

Having said previous points, bearing mind that allocated time were insufficient to find common grounds as our objective in this session, Indonesia emphasize the need of balance approach and process in all agenda items prior to and during COP 26.

We would like to sincerely appreciate SBSTA Chair for conducting a Dialogue on Oceans and Climate in 2020 as mandated in Madrid-decision. Indonesia would like to bring the element of ocean and climate nexus forward in Glasgow.

We thank the Presidency in providing windows for discussing ways on how the Santiago network on loss and damage will be operationalized in catalysing technical assistance for developing countries by also taking the benefit of and avoid duplication an effort from other relevant bodies under the UNFCCC and PA, as well as catalysing the provision of means of implementation for developing county Parties.

Indonesia restates our view regarding any possibility for having in-person meeting prior to and during COP26 in the condition of controlled COVID-19 pandemic as well as any potential restriction for some countries, to allow parties to make further progress for all agenda items.

We are looking forward for further engagement in this matter in fully party driven and inclusive process towards incoming session in Glasgow.
